REQUEST FOR QUOTES – RFQ LPM 2017-17

**GENERAL MAINTENANCE FOR
THE WAIĀLUA COURTHOUSE
DRIVEWAY**

To all Interested Parties:

Notice is hereby given that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (hereinafter “OHA”) will be accepting quotes from interested Offerors to provide general maintenance on the driveway for the historic Waiālua Courthouse located at 66-207 Kamehameha Highway, Hale‘iwa, O‘ahu, TMK No: 6-6-009: 023.

This Request for Quotes (hereinafter ‘RFQ’) is provided for information purposes. If you are interested in responding to this solicitation you may download the RFQ from the OHA website: www.oha.org/solicitations; the SPO website: <https://hiepro.ehawaii.gov/welcome.html>; and/or pick up a copy at the OHA’s Procurement Unit on O‘ahu, located at 560 North Nimitz Highway, Suite 200, Honolulu, Hawaii 96817, between the hours of 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. beginning Friday, June 23, 2017.

Site inspection shall be conducted on Friday, June 30, 2017 at 10:00 a.m. at the historic Waiālua Courthouse located at 66-207 Kamehameha Highway, Hale‘iwa, O‘ahu, TMK No: 6-6-009: 023. The site inspection is not required, however it provides an opportunity to inspect the property, become familiar with existing cultural conditions, rules and regulations and the extent and nature of the work to be performed.

Quotes shall be received through the HIEPRO website by 12:00 noon, HST on July 11, 2017.

The RFQ may be canceled when it is determined to be in the best interest of the OHA. If you have any questions, you may contact Phyllis Ono-Evangelista, Procurement Manager, by email phylliso@oha.org or by phone (808) 594-1833.

The successful Offeror will have twelve (12) months from the Notice to Proceed to complete the scope of services. Maximum length of contract is twelve (12) months.

A. General Information and Requirements

1. **Historical Information:** The Waiālua Courthouse is a historic structure and a marquee landmark listed in the Hawai‘i State Register of Historic Places and located near the gateway to Hale‘iwa Town. The Courthouse is being managed by the OHA in order to provide a land base for beneficiaries and beneficiary organizations to gather, meet, plan, and perpetuate Hawaiian culture. As such, community groups such as hula hālau currently use the meeting room facilities once or twice a week. The office space is currently being occupied by Hi‘ipaka LLC, who also oversees the daily operations of the Courthouse. The successful Offeror shall work with the OHA and Hi‘ipaka LLC to schedule contract services.
2. The interested Offeror is required to furnish all labor, materials, tools, transportation, incidental and supplies and to determine the means, methods and schedules required to complete the work in accordance with the contract documents within a fixed-price contract. The Quote shall itemize all costs associated with providing the services above including, but not limited to the General Excise Tax.
3. The driveway entering into the parking lot of the Waiālua Courthouse shows areas of localized distress, edge cracks, settlement/grade depressions, and presents possible drainage issues. See Exhibit 1: Waiālua Courthouse Driveway Photos.
4. The interested Offeror shall provide their Quote based on their recommendation of anticipated work. Such work may include, but may not be limited to crack sealing, sweeping and overlaying, and cold patching where necessary to correct pooling. Should milling be required, the Contractor shall include reclamation and leveling, and shall remedy what appears to be rutting in the driveway.
5. The OHA will grant a Right-of-Entry to the successful Offeror upon the initiation of this contract, which the successful Offeror shall comply with during its access and use of the property.

B. Requirements

1. **Fixed-Price Proposal.** The interested Offeror shall provide one fixed-priced proposal for the complete project that includes every aspect of the work.
2. **Specifications.** The work shall comply with the State, Federal and County statutes, rules and requirements. Under the Hawaii Revised Statutes (hereinafter “HRS”) section 444-7(b) the interested Offeror shall hold the “A” general engineering contractor classification and pursuant to the HRS chapter 44 and Hawaii Administrative Rules (hereinafter “HAR”) chapter 16-77, must be compliant to provide services for this project.
3. **Executions.** The work shall be conducted in compliance with State, Federal and County laws and requirements including the American Society for Testing and Material International (hereinafter “ASTM”) and the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (hereinafter “AASHTO”) standards.

4. The interested Offeror shall be required to obtain all required insurance as a part of the contract price. The successful Offeror shall not commence any work until it obtains all required insurance. All insurance must be maintained with a company authorized by law to issue such insurance in the State of Hawaii. The successful Offeror shall maintain all insurance until final acceptance of the work by the OHA.
5. Permits and Licenses. As a part of the contract price, the successful Offeror shall obtain all permits and licenses required by law to perform the work and pay charges, fees and taxes incidental to obtaining such permits and licenses. The successful Offeror assumes exclusive responsibility for identifying and acquiring all permits and licenses necessary to perform the work, except for those permits and licenses identified in the contract documents as being the responsibility of the OHA.
6. The successful Offeror shall provide proper safety signs, as necessary, and shall not obstruct the free flow of traffic and public right-of-way access.
7. The successful Offeror's vehicles shall be restricted to the existing roadways located in the Project Area, unless otherwise approved of by the OHA.
8. The successful Offeror shall post temporary signage at the entrance of the Project Area and near the work areas to notify the public of any closed areas during scheduled work. No area should be closed without the OHA's consent.
9. The successful Offeror shall provide written notification to the neighbors and relevant stakeholders of noise, debris, and other related issues arising out of work activities, as deemed necessary by the OHA. Such notification shall identify dates, times and durations of the work to be performed.
10. Wage Certificate. All interested Offerors shall complete and submit the Wage Certification Form certifying that the services required will be performed pursuant to HRS, Section 103-55. See Exhibit 2: Wage Certificate.
11. Working Hours - Night Work. Normal working hours shall be from 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, excluding holidays. Work performed between 3:30 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. of the following day is "night work". Night, weekend or holiday work shall not be permitted except as arranged in advanced with the Contract Coordinator and the OHA. See Exhibit 3: OHA 2017 Holiday Schedule.
12. Safety Precautions and Programs. The successful Offeror shall notify owners of adjacent properties and of underground (or overhead) utilities when performing work which may affect the owners; and shall cooperate with the owners in the protection, removal and replacement of their property.

The successful Offeror shall not permit any load to be placed on the work, any structure, or roadway or any other location that may endanger the safety of any persons or cause damage to any property. The successful Offeror shall not injure or destroy trees or shrubs that are identified in the contract documents for preservation nor remove or cut them without permission of the Contract Coordinator. The successful Offeror shall protect all land

monuments and property marks until an authorized agent has witnessed or otherwise referenced their location and shall not remove them until directed.

13. Workforce. The successful Offeror shall provide all supervision, skill and unskilled labor needed to perform the work. The successful Offeror shall prepare a list of all the names of personnel working for the Contractor and any subcontractors, the list shall be submitted to the Contract Coordinator at least fourteen (14) days prior to commencement of work.
 14. Equipment. The successful Offeror shall also provide the Contract Coordinator with a list of all equipment, listing the manufacturer, model, serial number of all equipment to be used on this project at least seven (7) days prior to the commencement of any work. Any vehicle utilized by the contractor is also considered equipment. The successful Offeror must provide make, year model number and license plate number of all such equipment. The successful Offeror must notify the Contract Coordinator in writing at least 24 hours in advance of the pending removal of any contractor owned equipment.
 15. Subcontractors. The successful Offeror shall be responsible for the conduct and workmanship of subcontractors engaged in the Project, and for Subcontractors compliance with the term of the Scope of Work. The successful Offeror is responsible for the behavior and workmanship of Subcontractors while on the Waialua Court House property.
 16. Modification to Contract. The successful Offeror shall not incur any costs beyond those described in the Scope of work unless directed in writing by the OHA. Any work performed by the successful Offeror beyond this Scope of Work without written direction from the OHA shall be at the risk and at no cost to the OHA. All modifications and terminations of the contract shall be in compliance with the HAR §3-125.
- C. Submittals. The successful Offeror is responsible to submit the following documents in response to this Request for Quotes.
1. All work under this Scope of Work shall be performed by Construction Contractor having experience on asphalt works. The successful Offeror shall have the following qualifications:
 - a. Requires a valid A Contractors License;
 - b. Qualifications for installation firm and installation supervisor;
 - c. A list of relevant projects. Do not list projects that proposed staff were not involved in, even if your firm was;
 - d. Qualifications/Experience of the firm; and
 - e. References.
 2. Materials. The successful Offeror shall provide product data and material safety data sheets for the mix type selection hot or cold mix asphalt as determined for use on this project.
 3. Proposed design and schedule. The successful Offeror shall submit a project design and schedule with their quote. The successful Offeror shall reflect their recommendation project phase, phase of activity and activity duration. A written narrative shall also be

included with the quote explaining the schedule submitted and the reasons why and how it can be completed in the time frame proposed by the successful Offeror. The submitted schedule and narrative shall be reviewed by the OHA.

4. Hazard control measure plan. The successful Offeror shall document how the hazard control will be implemented and maintained during the project.
5. Housekeeping. The successful Offeror is responsible to clean up daily after working. All cleanups shall be done and completed before 3:30 p.m. daily. The successful Offeror shall properly dispose of all soiled rags and protect unused product.

D. Scope of Work

1. The successful Offeror shall be responsible to work with necessary agencies (e.g. the State Historic Preservation Division) and procure all necessary permits, licenses, goods, services, and materials as required to complete the Scope of Services.
2. Asphalt work. The asphalt work shall include the driveway into the historic Waiālua Courthouse located at 66-207 Kamehameha Highway, Hale‘iwa, O‘ahu, TMK No: 6-6-009: 023.
 - a. Preparation. The successful Offeror shall assess all points that are affected and mark out all areas as identified by the attached photos. Additional areas shall be identified by the successful Offeror and submitted as “Additional Areas of Concern”. The successful Offeror shall await the OHA written authorization prior to conducting any work on the “Additional Areas of Concern”.
 - b. The successful Offeror shall ensure the surface to be paved is clean and compress air and any dust shall not be present for the adhesion of primer and tack coat.
 - c. The asphalt paver shall lay the material to the required thickness and level.
3. Asphalt
 - a. All asphalt material shall be approved by the OHA before any application. The successful Offeror shall submit in advance all aggregates and asphalt analysis as per ASTM and AASHTO standards.
 - b. The asphalt paver shall lay the material to the required thickness and level.
 - c. The mix shall be compacted as soon as possible after spreading the material. Should rolling be required, the successful Offeror shall assure the rolling shall follow laying operation to carry out breakdown rolling up to temperature of 110-120 degrees and sufficient passes shall be made to achieve the required compaction.

Rolling shall start from the sides and proceed toward the center. Each tip of the roll shall overlap the previous trip by at least 30 centimeters. Roller wheel shall be kept moistened. The roll shall be capable of reversing without backlash and shall be free from worn parts.

- d. Any joints shall be prepared by cutting vertically down by means of asphalt saw cutting machine or with jack hammer. The joint shall be cleaned well by compressed air and tack coat material shall be applied on the vertical and

horizontal surface for better bonding. Extremely good care shall be taken when asphalt is laid at construction joints.

- e. The areas not requiring heavy rollers shall be compacted with plate compactors or hand tampers. It shall be leveled, shaped (1:6 ratios) and compacted to 90% maximum dry density.

4. Tack Coating

- a. The furnishing and applying of tack on existing asphalt or concrete surface, or both, shall be in compliance with the Hawaii Department of Transportation (hereinafter "HIDOT") 2005 Standard Specification with Section 407-Tack Coat.
- b. The surface shall be cured for the period as per manufacturer's recommendation until a tacky surface is visible.

5. Closeout

- a. At completion of work the successful Offeror shall clean any impacted areas to conditions equal to original condition.
- b. All packing and/or shipping material and construction debris are to be disposed of in a legal manner outside the Waiālua Courthouse property.
- c. Should the asphalt require testing, such test shall be performed by an independent certified laboratory at the successful Offeror's expense.

E. Commencement, Prosecution, and Completion of Work

1. The successful Offeror shall be required to:

- a. Commence work under this contract within five (5) working days after the date the Contractor receives the Notice to Proceed;
- b. Prosecute the work diligently, and
- c. Complete the entire work ready for use not later than the proposed days in the schedule after the NTP. The time stated for completion shall include the final cleanup of the premises.

F. Responsibilities and Project Management

1. The OHA Contract Coordinator will be assigned to ensure quality assurance goals are met. The successful Offeror shall provide the Contract Coordinator access to the site at all times.
2. Point of Contact. The Contract Coordinator shall be the main point of contact for this Project. The successful Offeror shall report to the Contract Coordinator on:
 - a. Status of the Project;
 - b. Changes in Schedule;
 - c. Accidents and safety issues;
 - d. Disruptions to utility services; and
 - e. All other important information pertaining to the project.
3. English Speaking Representative. The successful Offeror shall provide an English-speaking representative on-site during all work hours with the authority to make all decisions on behalf of the successful Offeror and subcontractors.

4. Management Personnel. The successful Offeror shall staff the site, full time, with a competent senior manager who shall perform project management. Remote project management is not an option. This individual shall keep a detailed written history of the project and shall update the OHA weekly.
5. Site Security. The successful Offeror is responsible for on – site security as necessary to ensure no unauthorized access to their work site. The successful Offeror is 100% responsible for securing their working materials and equipment. Any damage to facilities or infrastructure which happened due to a lack of security will be the responsibility of the successful Offeror to correct.
6. Successful Offeror’s Temporary Work Center. The successful Offeror will be permitted to use a designated area within the contract limits for operation of his construction equipment and office of warranted. If directed by the Contract Coordinator, the successful Offeror shall not receive additional compensation to relocate his/her operations. On completion of the Contract, all facilities shall be removed from the mobilization area within five (5) days of final acceptance by the successful Offeror and shall be disposed of in accordance with applicable State, Federal and County laws and regulations. The site shall be cleared of construction debris and other materials and the site restored to its final grade. The successful Offeror is responsible for maintaining the site in a clear orderly manner.
7. Health and Safety. The successful Offeror shall be solely responsible for risk assessment, and managing health and safety issues associated with this project. Based on hazard assessments, the successful Offeror shall provide or afford each affected employee personal protective equipment (hereinafter “PPE”) that will protect the employee from hazards. At a minimum PPE shall consist of eye protection, hard hats, closed toe shoes and respiratory protection with filters. If the workers arrive on –site with sandals or athletic shoes, the successful Offeror is expected to provide rubber boots to them or send them home. All construction workers and management personnel must wear hard hats at all times on the construction site. Other PPE such as gloves, dust masks, air respirators and boots are recommended. These items are provided at the successful Offeror’s expense. Workers may use discretion if they feel unsafe in using the equipment in a hostile environment.

The Contract must document for work how the hazard control shall be implemented and maintained during the project. The successful Offeror shall prepare and implement an Activity Hazard Analysis prior to the start of work. The Contract must have a competent person on-site for inspection of equipment, training workers in the safe use of equipment and the recognition of hazards related to their use, supervision, and identifying and correcting unsafe work practices for high hazard work.
